It was the diligence of the Boston Police Department in securing the return of his kidnapped son in 1966 that led him on the path of fulfilling a childhood dream.

His mother often recounted him telling her at the age of three that he wanted to grow up to become a motorcycle officer. When opportunity knocked he answered, becoming one of only four blacks in his class at the academy.

It took hutzpah, to be one of a few for years and to sludge through the intersections of Civil Justice and Human Rights which changed the face of the BPD to become more inclusive for African Americans, Latinx, ethnic groups, women and LGBTQ+. Like so many of the young lions of his generation they not only made opportunity a reality, they not only kicked in the gates, they propped them open for others to enter all the while standing on the shoulders of those who came before.

These social and cultural gains were replicated across the landscape of this country redefining access and how economic and political power could transform lives.

Billy rose through the ranks from; Patrol Officer, Detective, became Commissioner of Suffolk County House of Corrections at Deer Island, returned to the BPD as Deputy Superintendent, Superintendent of Area B, and was recruited to become Director of Newark, New Jersey Police in 1991.

What an accomplishment for a young black man who grew up in Boston during the 40's and 50's, who was raised by a single mother supporting the family on the income as a domestic, to emerge as one of the Architects of change for Law Enforcement in the last century not only in the city of Boston but on the national front.

He was one of the founders of the union for African American Corrections & Law Enforcement Professionals, as well as the Massachusetts Association of Afro-American Police (MAAAP) which later became MAMLEO.


He met luminaries and dignitaries, he met presidents and a Pope, there was a picture that he always proudly displayed, of he and the smiling then President of South Africa, Nelson Mandela shaking hands. No one could ever have predicted this career path. Above all, and most importantly, he was most proud that he was able through his work to serve and represent his cherished community.

There were so many places where the Celester name carried weight and respect within the community as well as outside of it.

His storage compartment is full of boxed up plaques and framed honors, on the day of homecoming, many will extol his numerous accomplishments but do not forget to tell the many stories that will have everyone doubled over in laughter because that is who he was a complex beloved son of Boston.













Sometimes dreams really do come true.

Take for example, William Richard Celester, Jr., also know widely and affectionately as "Billy."

Billy was born to Edith and William Celester, Sr. in 1943, he arrived 5 minutes before his identical wombmate, Larry (Lawrence).

The twins and elder sister Joyce (Kelly) grew up in Lower Roxbury near Madison Park, off of Sterling, Ruggles, and Tremont Streets. They were members at Peoples Baptist Church where they attended Sunday School.

Everybody knew the Celester twins, they were notorious. It was always Billy and Larry or Larry and Billy. If they weren't together then they were usually within the same vicinity as the other. In fact, they weren't separated in school until the eighth grade when their teacher had had enough of their twin antics. As one can imagine, they were always up to some sort of hijinks.

They were so identical that their mother Edie, had two of the exact school pictures of Billy pasted in the family album, she swore up and down for the longest that it was the both of them.

Being twins served the brothers well, it provided visibility, but they were also charismatic, they exuded a certain je ne sais quoi, which made people want to be around them.

In the ensuing years, Billy became a Boy Scout, was a Marseille Dukes, did a stint in the military, entered the trades, married, became a father to his first son Kevin, 62. His second marriage to life long partner, Maggie Lee, produced three children; William III, 56, Sonya and Eileen, (both deceased).
